Two roads diverged in a yellow wood,

The speaker, walking through a forest whose leaves have turned yellow in autumn, comes to a fork in the road

/dai'v3:dʒ/ verb (formal): to separate and go in different directions. OPP. Converge \rightarrow We went through school and college together, but then our paths diverged.

/wod/ noun: an area of trees, smaller than a forest; Symbolizes the autumn of the speaker's life but also indicates a place of beauty. The colour yellow points to energy, happiness, and enlightenment, while the wood may suggest mystery and trial.

Fork /fɔ:k/ verb: (of a road, river, etc.) to divide into two parts that lead in different directions. \rightarrow *The path forks at the bottom of the hill*.

A fork in the road is a metaphor, based on a literal expression, for a deciding moment in life or history when choice of presented options is required and once chosen the choice cannot be reversed.

And sorry I could not travel both And be one traveler

The speaker, regretting that he or she is unable to travel by both roads (since he or she is, after all, just one person)

Traveller (BrE)

long I stood And looked down one as far as I could

stands at the fork in the road for a long time and tries to see where one of the paths leads

To where it bent in the <mark>undergrowth</mark>;

However, the speaker can't see very far because the forest is dense and the road is not straight.

/'Andəgrəv θ / noun [U] a mass of bushes and plants that grow close together under trees in woods and forests. \rightarrow The murder weapon was found concealed in undergrowth. Then took the other, as just as fair,

The speaker takes the other path, judging it to be just as good a choice as the first.

Just as (adv.) : to an equal degree

(adj.) quite good, nice; "Took the other, as just as fair" means that this road that I took is just as nice as the other one.

And having perhaps the better claim, Because it was grassy and wanted wear;

and supposing that it may even be the better option of the two, since it is grassy and looks less worn than the other path.

/'gra:si/ adj. Covered with grass

Less used; = Off the beaten track (IDM): less travelled by
