----- **Are** Lisa and Emma running home? → Yes, ----- **they are**.

----- **Is** she playing the piano? → No, ----- **she isn't**.

----- **Are** you texting Lenny? → Yes, ----- **I am**.

----- **Is** the lady swimming in the lake? → Yes, ----- **she is**.

Is ----- the man buying oranges? → No, ----- he isn't -----.

Are ----- the friends having an ice cream? → No, ----- they aren't -----.

Is ----- the lion sleeping? → Yes, ----- it is -----.

Are ----- they drinking tea? → No, ----- they aren't -----.

Are ----- you waiting for the bus? → No, ----- we aren't -----.

take / photos / they / every Monday

They take photos every Monday.

goes / every day / she / to school

She goes to school every day.

football / Eric / after school / plays

Eric plays football after school.

is making / he / at the moment / breakfast

He is making breakfast at the moment.

to the club / the girls / go / on Saturdays

The girls go to the club on Saturdays.

o'clock / school / at / 8 / starts

School starts at 8 o'clock.

Tuesday / the boys / their bikes / ride / every

The boys ride their bikes every Tuesday.

I / home / going / am / now

I am going home now.

Simon / on Fridays / the dishes / washes

Simon washes the dishes on Fridays.

are / questions / we / answering / the / now

We are answering the questions now.

fish /don't/ we/ eat

We don't eat fish.

to work /by car/ go /Tim /doesn't

Tim doesn't go to work by car.

we /do/ not /to school /walk /often

We do not often walk to school.

can't /always/ win /you

You can't always win.

run /Jane /doesn't/ in the evening/ usually

Jane doesn't usually run in the evening.

have /to work /I /don't /on Sundays

I don't have to work on Sundays.

Come/ late/ we /don't /usually

We don't usually come late.

lunch /eat /doesn't/ at home/ she /often

She doesn't often eat lunch at home.

turn off /in the office /doesn't /he /his smartphone/ always

He doesn't always turn off his smartphone in the office.

don't /the buses /usually /on time/ run

The buses don't usually run on time.



**will-future, going to-future, Simple Present or Present Progressive**

## will-future, going to-future, Simple Present or Present Progressive

The train ----- **leaves** ----- at 11:45. *(to leave)*

We ----- **are going to have** ----- dinner at a nice restaurant on Saturday, but we haven't booked a table yet. *(to have)*

My ski instructor believes it ----- **will snow** ----- in the mountains tomorrow evening. *(to snow)*

On Sunday at 8 o'clock I ----- **am meeting** ----- my friend. *(to meet)*

They ----- **are flying** ----- to London on Friday evening at 8:15. *(to fly)*

## will-future, going to-future, Simple Present or Present Progressive

The English lesson ----- **starts** ----- at 8:45. (*to start*)

I ----- **am going to see** ----- my sister in April. (*to see*)

Look at the clouds - it ----- **is going to rain** ----- in a few minutes. (*to rain*)

Listen! There's someone at the door. I ----- **will open** ----- the door for you. (*to open*)

Wait! I ----- **Will drive** ----- you to the station. (*to drive*)
